To develop sustainable ecosystems that generate a transformative impact and to accompany groups in vulnerable situations through the mobilization of civil society.

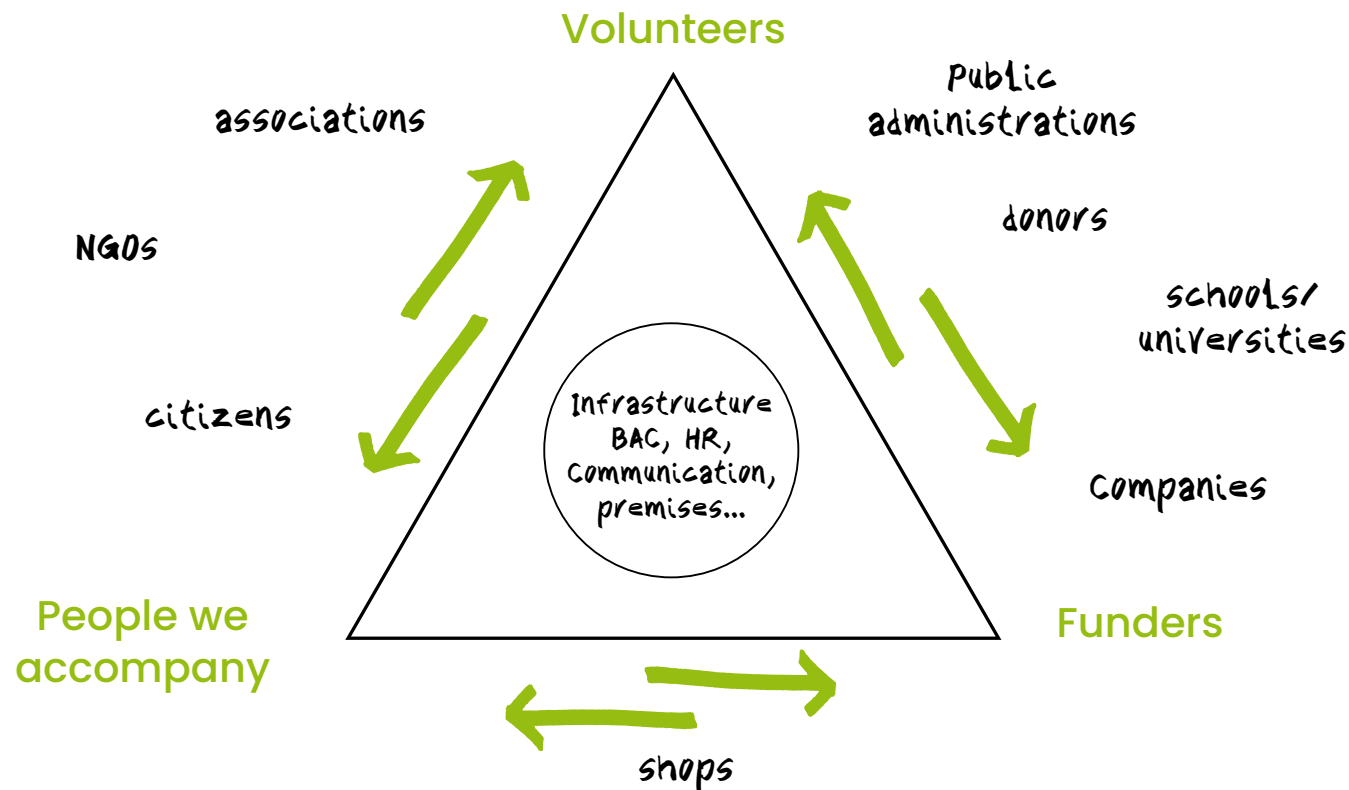

LANGUAGE ITINERARY

II. To promote greater autonomy and connection within their surroundings, thereby increasing opportunities for training and employment.

LANDING

The Landing Program is the reception, orientation and support program dedicated to adults at risk and in situations of social vulnerability (migrants without support in the host territory and the homeless) and their development. Its main pillars are the creation or strengthening of support networks through socialization, training, administrative/legal advice, psychosocial support, and job integration.





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GENERAL OBJECTIVES

I. Social integration and autonomy for those we accompany.

We work together through language classes, recreational-training activities, legal, educational, and employment counseling.

II. To raise awareness and mobilize with migrants and homeless people.

The bond that emerges from the support provided creates a transformative experience for both parties and offers a space where the person who is accompanied can express themselves, be heard and orient themselves better.

It also allows volunteers to learn about other cultures and break down established prejudices and stereotypes.

III. To promote links with other organizations.

We provide various information and counseling points to reduce the legal and administrative obstacles associated with the entire migration process.



"I left my country five years ago and arrived in Barcelona last October," says Jack Choung. During the first few days, he wandered around the city and spoke to everyone he could to explore possibilities that would allow him to generate an income and find a place to live, but nothing worked out. So, with the last of his savings, he decided to buy a sleeping bag, a tent and a metro card to get through the coming weeks in the city.*

He continued to look for other resources and options when he heard about the Raval facility. *"I went for dinner and saw that there were blackboards on the walls,"* explains Jack Choung, and a dinner guest confirmed that there in the premises, in addition to offering dinners and breakfasts, they also gave language classes, among many other activities. *"I want to live my life here, and I want to be part of the Barcelona community,"* he says when he explains that his top priority is to learn Spanish and Catalan.

A few days after that first dinner, he spoke to the person in charge of the Landing program at the orientation point, and in less than a week, he was a student in all the of Spanish classes offered by the Foundation. *"I asked if I could go every day, from Tuesday to Saturday, and they said yes, and that's what I'm doing,"* explains Jack Choung with a smile, while admitting that he had just started attending

the Reading Room and give one to one classes.

"They also invited me to participate in other recreational activities and corporate volunteering programs," he says, emphasizing that these not only allowed him to network with local people but were also key to meeting and creating a strong support bond with other young people in the Landing program who were homeless. *"We shared a table at dinners and breakfasts in the Raval and also shared advice on how to cope with our daily lives in Barcelona,"*

"They told me about the BACstation shelters one night when it was starting to get very cold," he explains, although he admits that he didn't have much hope of getting a spot because there are many young people living on the streets. Nevertheless, a few weeks later, he received a message that he had to reread more than twice to fully believe it was real. *"The next day, I could already start sleeping at the BACstation".*

"Now I have a home, and that allows me to focus on my future," he says, comparing it to living on the streets, where he had to spend his energy finding places to eat, to shower, and to stay warm. *"The support from BarcelonActua is a social elevator; it has given me opportunities to be on the same level as local people and to be part of the community. Now I can start my life,"* he emphasizes. From the moment he arrived, it was clear that he wanted to study. Today he has prepared a plan of action; to enroll in higher education and find a high value-added job in his city, Barcelona.

LANDING WOMEN

The Landing Women program aims to promote actions and activities to break down the stereotypes and stigmas surrounding migrant women at risk of social exclusion.

The women participating in the program receive support from people of reference and take part in socialization activities and benefit from personalized plans focused on legal and administrative support, education and employment. All of this is done from a holistic perspective based on their rights: they are seen as women with strengths, skills and potential.

GENERAL OBJECTIVES

I. To improve social and economic inclusion which vulnerable women need to develop self sufficiency for themselves and their families.

We are aware that each woman has a unique set of circumstances, with specific external and internal factors (housing situation, weak social and family ties, the emotional management of migratory mourning,

information about entities and resources in the host territory, etc.). The program is very flexible and is structured to be as agile as possible, so that support can be adapted to everything the woman needs, in the here and now.

II. To strengthen their support network and improve access to resources for a dignified life.

To reinforce their network, women have the support of a solid team of volunteers (activity coordinators, mentors, coaches, language volunteers) who act as a support and provide a special space to develop their various skills.



"I didn't want to emigrate. I was forced to leave my country," says Nancy. She decided to come to Barcelona because an acquaintance of her sister was looking for someone to take care of her daughter and offered accommodation in exchange. And even though she had no income or support network, the first thing she did upon arrival was to look for a place where she could volunteer. "I like to help even though I don't have much for myself, because it nourishes and fulfills me," she says.

"The cousin of the girl I take care of knew about BarcelonActua and showed me the BAC App. I saw the dinner activity at Raval and signed up right away," explains Nancy with a genuine smile. In Venezuela, until her situation allowed, she volunteered on her own, distributing food to people living on the streets. And now in Barcelona, she wanted to continue doing it. "I volunteer from the heart," says Nancy.

And so she did. She started as a volunteer for the dinners at Raval and has become a key figure. *"There, I also met Montse, the volunteer coordinator of the Women's Circle," she explains with a shy smile. Montse told her about all the support given to women and invited her to be part of Landing Dones.*

"I had just arrived in Barcelona, I had no friends and I felt isolated. That's why I decided to join the Women's Circle," Nancy recounts, acknowledging that there she could meet new people but also different perspectives and realities. "Now I tell everyone about the circle and explain that we express ourselves and have fun while supporting and learning a great deal."

Participating in the Women's Circle motivated her to fully engage in the program, starting Catalan classes and a training course to boost her job searching. *"Moreover, I met with the lawyer to find out the best option for me at a time when it seemed impossible to get an appointment to process my asylum application," explains Nancy.*

She spent more than a year calling day after day without anyone answering the phone. *"Having the support of a volunteer therapist from GRAAS was essential for me to get through it. She helped me to manage my anxiety and continue with the process," Nancy says gratefully.*

Today, Nancy has finally secured an appointment to apply for asylum and is waiting for the resolution. As she explains this, she emphasizes that since she started her journey with BAC, each person has contributed something to her. *"When I arrived, I had nothing. I was in a place, but not really there. Now BAC is my home. It's my family, a family full of wonderful people who have been there 100% when I needed it and even when I didn't," she shares with a smile in her eyes.*

BAC STATION

The program was established in 2020 in the middle of the pandemic as an emergency residential resource for homeless, migrant youths. The BACstations are temporary spaces and the fundamental pillars are training, socialization, administrative/legal support and job integration.

They are homes where the young residents can live, eat and take refuge whilst continuing with their educational and language learning goals. We also work towards their social integration so they can achieve full emancipation and autonomy.





GENERAL OBJECTIVES

I. To train, integrate and empower homeless migrant youth through a welcoming space.

Education is the foundation of a dignified and enriching future. That is why all the people in our care are committed to receive training. At the same time, we provide comprehensive support for their administrative, legal, and employment situations to help them achieve self sufficiency.

II. To raise awareness among civil society and to mobilize them with young migrants with no family referents, in vulnerable situations.

Volunteer mentors, academic advisors, language tutors, therapists, job coaches, kitchen volunteers and recreational activity volunteers involved in the project establish connections with the individuals being supported through the process of accompaniment.

This provides a transformative experience for both parties, offering a space of safety and understanding where the students receiving support can express themselves, be heard, and gain better guidance. It also allows volunteers to learn about other cultures and break free from established prejudices and stereotypes.



"Just today, my sister sent me a message telling me that she had achieved the grade she needed to study medicine at university", explains Ahmed with a twinkle in his eye. His sister will be the first member of his family to go to university and Ahmed couldn't be prouder.

Ahmed had to drop out of secondary school early to find a job and help support his family. *"I wanted to study, but if you don't have anyone to support you, it's impossible. Now my sister has me", Ahmed says with satisfaction .*

He explains that when he first arrived in Barcelona, he knew he wanted to study, find a good job and fulfil his dream of building a house for his family. His first step was to attend the Spanish classes run by BarcelonActua. *"I started when the Foundation had just opened its first shelter home. I knew that, in a matter of months, I'd be too old to stay where I was living and that I'd end up on the streets, so they offered me a place at BACstation."*

He admits that he was initially a bit nervous about moving into a new house with strangers, but that everyone was very supportive. *"My colleagues and the volunteers I met through the activities are now my family here in Barcelona", he says. He also points out that his support teacher, Adela, ended up becoming his point of reference and provided him with huge emotional support. Through her, Ahmed secured the job contract that enabled him to get his papers in order. "She was with me every step of the way."*

"The day I got my papers, I called my mum. She said she hoped I could go and visit her now," says Ahmed, who admits that if it weren't for that job, he'd have bought a ticket that same day. "Now everything is fine. All I need is to go on holiday to Morocco to see my family and hug my sister before she leaves for university," he explains with a smile.

With his official papers in order, a steady job and a room, Ahmed will be bidding farewell to his colleagues, his teachers and the place he has called home for two years. *"BACstations really are stations. Stops on the way to the future, a place where you can study and learn things you could never have imagined, all while receiving support throughout the administrative process that will help you reach your destination", explains Ahmed. "I've already reached my destination, which is why I'm leaving. But I hope the project will continue to support many more people. I hope it never stops", he says, decisively.*

BAC-HOSTING FAMILIES

The BAC host families program works to create a bond between BACstation students and the BAC volunteers through spending time together. The program ensures the provision of basic needs such as board and lodgings for our students in vulnerable situations, whilst also enabling them to establish a new family circle and support network within the city.





GENERAL OBJECTIVES

I. To promote the emancipation of young people.

The creation of a strong family and support network is doubly complemented, both for the student through training, administrative and legal assistance, job placement, and socialization and for the family to ensure support during cohabitation

and success in building socio-affective bonds.

II. To raise awareness and mobilize civil society in support of vulnerable young migrants.

We establish a family-student-foundation contact that allows us to show, in a personal way, the realities

faced by many young migrants (homelessness, lack of a strong support network, irregular administrative situations, inability to access decent housing without education or employment, etc.) and helps engage people to be part of the solution.



"Fortunately, at night, I could sleep in an unoccupied house with other guys who, like me, were sleeping on the streets. It wasn't at all safe, but the street was even less so," explains Khalid.

He went to the BarcelonActua headquarters thinking he could find a place to attend Catalan and Spanish courses, but during the initial interview, he realized that not only could he take classes, but he could also *"find a home here."*

He started with Spanish classes and a gardening course, and a few days later, he was told about the Referents program. *"I loved the idea that someone who knows the city could accompany me,"* he says confidently. Ten days later, he had Helena's contact, his new mentor.

"After being informed that they had found a guy I could accompany, five minutes later, I received a message from Khalid" explains Helena with a contagious smile. That same day, they met. *"Even before seeing her, I trusted her completely,"* Khalid assures.

From that day on, they met every Tuesday. They talked and shared experiences, and in no time, they created a strong bond. Khalid met Helena's husband and their two young daughters, and Tuesdays turned into weekends and family vacations.

A few months after moving into the BACstation Vallcarca house, I saw a video about the BAChosting Families program," Khalid explains with a shy smile, stating that at that moment, he was sure. *"The BACstation is a place where they have trusted me, and where I can live in peace. That is very valuable. But I thought that in a family, I could improve my language skills*

much faster and continue studying" he explains.

"Khalid told me that he was on the waiting list to find a host family. And I don't even know how it happened, but after talking to my husband and the girls, I asked him if he wanted to come and live in our house," Helena explains with a sweet laugh. Khalid didn't hesitate for a second. It was very clear to him. *"It will be a dream,"* he answered emotionally.

The affection Khalid expresses is immeasurable, but it is not one-sided. *"It was a big change and a challenge, but you gain a lot. He has taught us many things. He's one of those people you want close to you and your family,"* Helena confesses tenderly.

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"For me, I no longer have a host family, we are family. I didn't have any sisters, and now I have two. And Helena and Romano are my parents here, in Barcelona," Khalid affirms, admitting that the best moment of the day is always when he's with all of them.

Helena agrees, and is aware that when she looks back, she will be able to relive a very beautiful period and asserts that *"no one should stop hosting out of fear."* She is clear that family shouldn't be about blood and that we are the ones who choose it. *"Hosting is giving someone an opportunity, who didn't have one. And that is something you never forget,"* Khalid firmly adds.

U-BAC SCHOLARSHIPS

The U-BAC University Scholarship program aims to promote social mobility through education by enabling talented youth from highly complex colleges in Barcelona to access university education.

The scholarships, which cover the the duration of the degree course, encompass a key pillar of the program: the constant and personalized monitoring of the students.

GENERAL OBJECTIVES

I. To facilitate university degrees for young people coming from highly complex colleges in Barcelona.

U-BAC Scholarships aim to promote young people in vulnerable situations to have the same opportunities for success as their peers. For many students, the impossibility of affording the initial enrollment fee and the uncertainty of receiving a public scholarship prevents them from

considering whether or not to attend university.

With U-BAC Scholarships, the payment of university enrollment, transportation, educational materials (including the co-financing of a computer depending on good academic results) and English classes are covered.

At the same time, there is individual

and group accompaniment using the programs techniques; emotional help with therapists and academic aid with mentors to ensure students fulfill the steps necessary for success. This accompanying support is crucial to obtaining high grades of excellence, which is key to the program.



"Second year of high school was a very tough year," confesses Ion. Anxiety often overshadowed the academic year, and although he was determined to go to university, he knew that his parents were already making a great financial effort to cover the cost of his psychological support. He didn't want to put more pressure on them. "They told me they would do everything possible, but so that they wouldn't have to struggle, I started looking for scholarships," he explains.

"The coordinator of the U-BAC Scholarships program came to my high school to introduce us to the program," Ion recounts, admitting that before hearing the presentation, he thought that, like the other scholarships he had seen, it would be just another one where he would become a number and not a person with all his complexities. "But I saw that it was a scholarship that went beyond that, that supported people on different levels, and that I could present my personal situation and explain who I was," he says.

Ion decided to apply, and after submitting all the documentation, along with a letter of motivation, he and his parents attended the interview prior to the final selection. *"They tried to get to know me beyond the papers and numbers and understand me as a person," he recalls with a smile, highlighting that they even asked him about his hobbies, which he found very funny and distinctive.*

"I left feeling happy, although I wasn't sure if would be awarded the scholarship," he admits. A few days later, he received a call

from the program coordinator. "She began to explain the meeting with the jury, and as she spoke, I had the feeling that they hadn't awarded me the scholarship," Ion explains, and he admits that when she told him that he had been awarded the scholarship and would be a new U-BAC student in September, he couldn't believe it.

"She also told me that I could have a mentor, and there I was sure that they really cared and wanted me to be the best I could be and truly enjoy university life," Ion admits as he recalls the first meeting with Marcos, his mentor, who gave him a lot of confidence and security. "He always asks me, cares about me, and supports me so that I don't doubt myself," Ion emphasizes.

"Now I am very happy to have support and to be part of such a great group of people."

MIGRANT UP

In an increasingly diverse and heterogeneous society, where individuals facing administrative and socioeconomic vulnerability encounter significant obstacles in accessing higher education, the Migrant Up program works to ensure equal opportunities and promote the presence of racialized or migrants in high value-added jobs and positions of responsibility and visibility.

Migrant Up is a scholarship program for migrants with academic backgrounds from their home countries, as well as for

racialized or migrants with a strong interest in starting or continuing higher education.

The program provides information on the homologation, validation, and equivalence of studies, and also guides and supports individuals without prior training to develop a solid and well-motivated study plan. Additionally, it offers the emotional and social support necessary to successfully complete the education program. In this regard, the role of mentors is crucial throughout the study period.

GENERAL OBJECTIVES

I. To facilitate access to high value-added jobs for migrants with higher education degrees from their home countries.

Homologation and scholarships for pursuing complementary education make it possible for society to harness the potential and human capital of these individuals.

II. To promote the diversity of racialized and culturally different profiles within companies and administrations. Aiming for diversity be an asset for these organizations and at the same time, helping to breakdown sole associations of these profiles with low valued jobs.



"I arrived in Barcelona just after graduating in Journalism," says Gabriela. She came to meet her mother and sister, who were forced to leave Colombia to seek political asylum due to serious violence and threats. "I wanted to continue studying, but reality changed my perspective on the future," she recalls, mentioning that she was in an irregular administrative situation, without a job, and without any guarantees for anything.

Looking for organizations that support newly arrived migrant people to start building a network in the city, she found the BarcelonActua Foundation. *"It's a welcoming place, where if you want to build, they offer you a base,"* Gabriela emphasizes. For months, she was part of the LandingWomen program and participated in its weekly activities to continue creating a support network that would allow her to access new opportunities. *"Until they told me about the Migrant Up program,"* she explains with the characteristic smile that defines her, admitting that she was greatly encouraged to apply.

"For a moment, I forgot I was a journalist," she remarks, and she assures that *"you lose your identity"* when you live in an irregular situation and are forced into precariousness to survive. When she arrived, her only option was to work illegally, with workdays of more than 13 hours without rest, under threats from bosses, sexual assaults, and all this without any guarantee of being paid at the end of the month. When she learned about Migrant Up, a program that provides information and advice for the validation of titles, and grants scholarships for studies that allow migrants

to supplement their education, she knew it was just what she needed. *"I had put aside the idea of studying a long time ago."*

"I applied for the scholarship and told them my story to show them who I am and what my experience is," she says confidently. And on July 26th, the program coordinator informed her that she had been awarded the scholarship and additional support to pursue an international master's degree. *"Being able to study again made me feel like a person again, like I hadn't lost everything,"* she confesses.

Since October, Gabriela has been studying a Master's in International Cooperation, accompanied by psycho-emotional support and personalized monitoring through her mentor and BAC volunteer, Katherin, who has experience in the same field. *"And in less than a year, I'll have a master's degree and I'll be able to have the profession I want,"* Gabriela says with satisfaction.

"Education can transform lives," Gabriela admits, and she is clear that programs like Migrant Up allow everyone to choose their path on equal terms and prevent the obstacles of the system from making us lose ourselves or forget who we are and what our dreams are.



06. Volunteering

VOLUNTEERS IN GROUP ACTIVITIES



"I volunteer at BAC because I feel I can help by giving love, knowledge, and my time. What I like most about the breakfasts is the one-on-one relationship. I love talking about any topic that comes up, listening to different opinions, and sharing smiles and knowing looks... In general, the affection that is generated, both with the guests and among the volunteers."

At the same time, corporate volunteering offers new social and professional horizons to people at risk of exclusion through socialization and the bond created with volunteer workers.

In 2023, we started a new activity: awareness-raising talks in companies on topics such as diversity, inclusion, and migration, through first-person testimonies from people accompanied by our programs, who bring realities closer and breakdown prejudices.

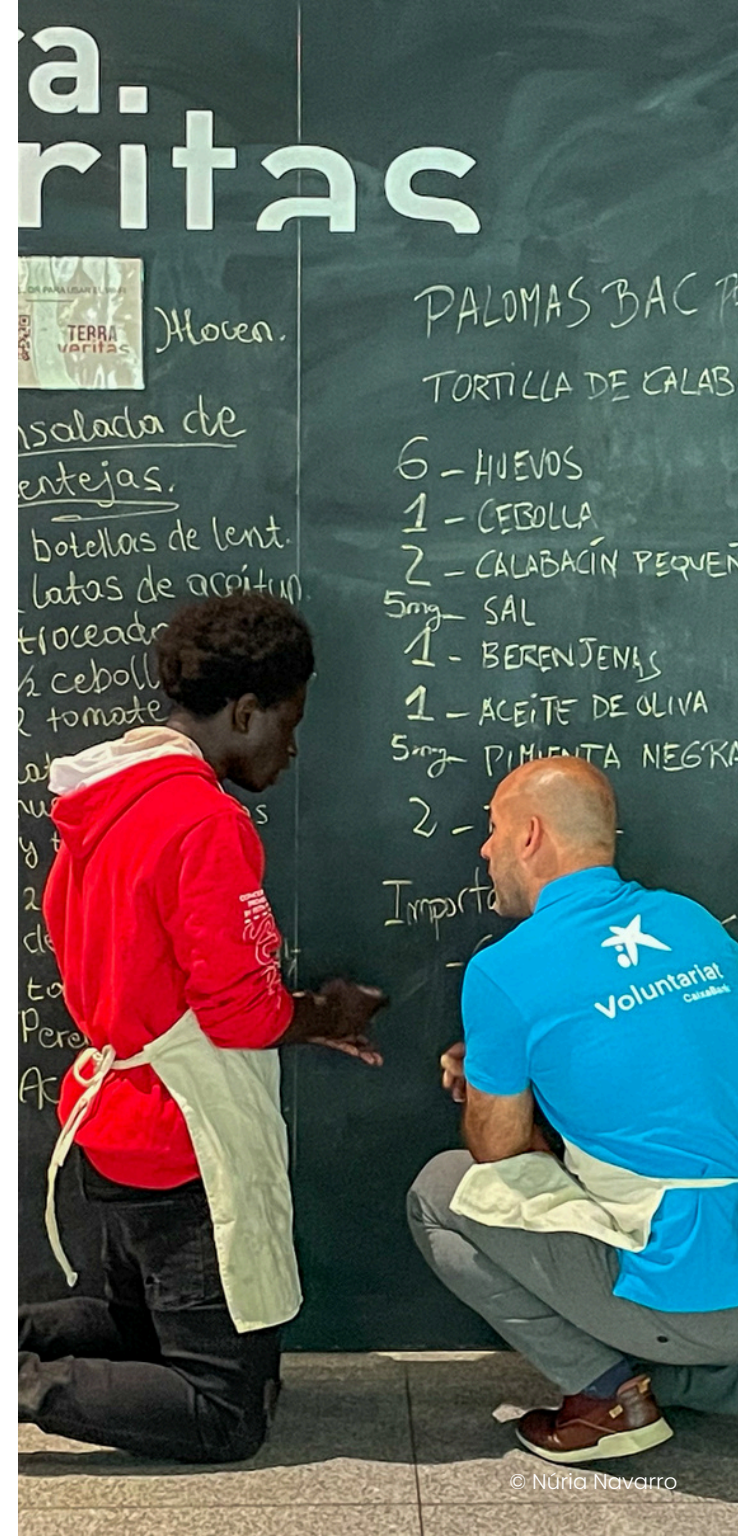

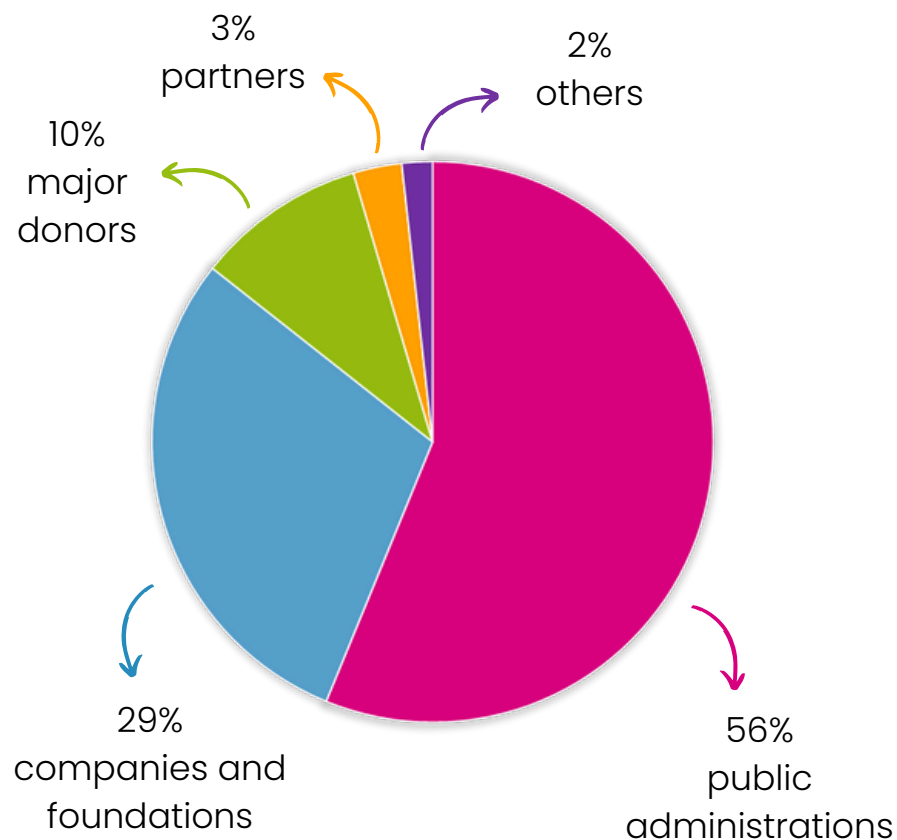

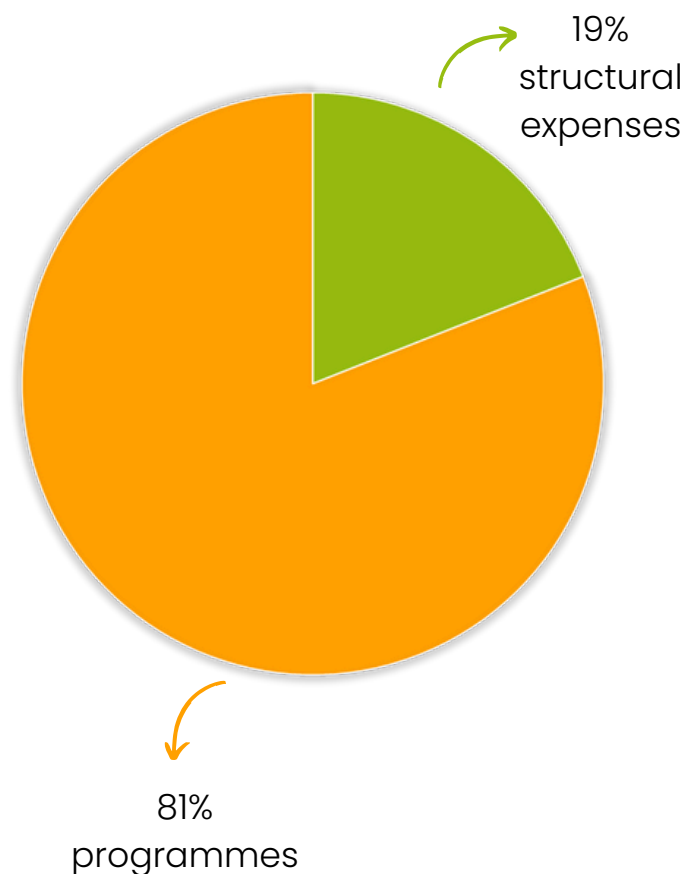
